Study Notes for To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee


This book presents a tender yet challenging look at life in a small Southern town in the 1930's. The main theme of the book is white Southern prejudice against blacks, and the courage of the few who take a stand against it, but it also features prejudice of many types. These include religious bigotry, anti-Semitism, fear of anything new and different, and the typical narrow-minded prejudices of many small town folk. Against the background of these themes, the noble-minded and courageous character of Atticus Finch emerges through the eyes of his daughter, Scout. The title, *To Kill A Mockingbird* is a symbolic theme of the sin of violence against innocence and beauty.
