They had humor and heroism, and Mr. Castor has drawn an excellent picture of these young Americans who stood united in their eagerness to finish the fighting and get home again. When they did-in a few months' time-Spain was finished as an empire and the United States stood on the threshold of the twentieth century as a world power.
