

antique (an tēk'). Things from long ago.

assembly line (u sem´ blē līn). Row of workers along which work is passed; each worker doing one job over and over.

automobile (ô´ tu mō bēl). Another name for a car.

barrels (bar' ulz). Something with curved sides, flat top, and bottom for holding things.

cables (kā' bulz). Strong, thick rope of wires wound together. **canal** (ku nal'). Waterway dug across land.

carriage (kar' ij). A wagon often pulled by horses.

cereal (sir' ē ul). Food made from oats, corn, rice, or wheat.

college (kol' ij). School of higher learning.

commercial (ku mėr' shul). A business.

compass (kum' pus). A thing that shows directions; it has a needle that points north.

costume (kos' tùm). Dress from another time or place.

engineer (en ju nir'). A person who plans or builds engines.

extinct (ek stingkt'). No longer alive.

factory (fak' tur ē). A building where things are made.

ferry (fer' ē). A boat that carries people or goods back and forth across water.

festival (fes' tu vul). Special days to remember some great times.

freighter (frā' tur). Ship that carries goods.

furniture (fer' nu chur). Beds, chairs, tables, and desks.

inspector (in spek' tur). A person who checks work.

invention (in ven' shun). Making something new.

lore (lôr). Stories about a certain subject.

magnetic (mag net' ik). Like a magnet; pulls or pushes.

manufacture (man yu fak' chur). To make something by machine.

minerals (min' ur ulz). Not plants or animals; like coal, gold, salt, and sand.

passenger pigeon (pas' un jur pij' un). Wild pigeon that flies in groups.

peninsula (pu nin' su lu). Land with water on three sides.

pheasant (fez' unt). Large game bird with brightly colored feathers and long tail.

resort (ri zôrt'). Place people go for playing, eating, and sleeping.

Straits of Mackinac (strāts uv mak' u nô). Narrow body of water joining two larger bodies of water (Lake Michigan and Lake Huron).

surveyor (sur vā' ur). A person who looks over the land.

suspension (su spen' shun). A bridge hung in cables between two towers.

tourist (tùr' ist). Person traveling for fun.


