## 14. Peaceful Coexistence

### Background Information

Exercise 14 deals with agreement of subject and verb. The rules are as follows:

**Rule 1:** Use a singular verb with a singular subject.

**Rule 2:** Use a plural verb with a plural subject.

**Rule 3:** The number of the subject is not changed by a phrase following the subject.  
(*Example:* This tree, unlike some others, grows quickly.)

**Rule 4:** These pronouns are singular: each, either, neither, one, everyone, everybody, no one, nobody, anyone, anybody, someone, and somebody.

(*Example:* Each of us *is* coming.)

**Rule 5:** These pronouns are plural: several, few, both, and many.

(*Example:* Several of us *are* coming.)

**Rule 6:** These pronouns may be either singular or plural: *some, all, most, any, or none.*

(*Examples:* Most of the play was interesting. Most of the plays we saw were interesting.)

**Rule 7:** Subjects joined by *and* take a plural verb.

(*Example:* Joe and Mary are coming to visit.)

**Rule 8:** Singular subjects joined by *or* or *nor* take singular verbs.

(*Example:* Joe or Mary *is* coming to visit.)

**Rule 9:** If a singular subject and a plural subject are joined by *or* or *nor* the verb agrees with the subject nearer the verb.

(*Example:* Two boys or one girl *is* still able to sign up.)

**Rule 10:** Words stating amounts are usually singular.

(*Example:* Twenty-five dollars *is* the entrance fee.)

**Rule 11:** *Every* or *many a* before a subject calls for a singular verb.

(*Example:* Many a songwriter starts in Nashville.)

### Answer Key

Each verb in the story that was used incorrectly has been marked with an asterisk (\*) and corrected. Each word that was spelled incorrectly has been underlined and respelled correctly. The misspelled words are *license*, *naturally*, *successfully*, *beginning*, and *relief*.

Jim is preparing for his driver's license exam. First, with the help of his two older brothers, Jim \*practices driving the family car around town. Jim knows that the rules in the driver's handbook \*need to be learned. Jim's driving handbook, unlike his other school books, \*rates careful study every evening. ### Additional Activities

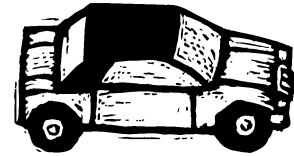
