
Wordly Wise 3000


Study the words below. Then do the exercises for the lesson.

An **accident** is anything that happens in an unplanned way, especially when it causes injury or damage. The <u>accident</u> happened when one car went through a red light and hit another one.




An **acrobat** is a person who does tricks that take great strength and good control in moving the body. The <u>acrobat</u> did a flip on the tightrope, and the crowd in the circus tent gasped.



An **alarm** is a signal, such as a bell or buzzer, that warns people or tells them to take action. Beth shut off the <u>alarm</u> on the clock and went back to sleep.

Alarm is a feeling that something is wrong or that there is danger. Pete was filled with <u>alarm</u> when he lost his way in the woods.


To **alarm** somebody is to make that person afraid or fearful. I don't want to <u>alarm</u> you, but what is that noise in the backyard?




To **bounce** is to spring back after hitting something. The ball <u>bounced</u> three feet in the air after Maya hit it with her racket.



Enormous means very big. An elephant must seem <u>enormous</u> to a mouse.





A **gap** is an opening or space in something that is normally closed. The rabbit got into the garden through a <u>gap</u> in the fence.


A **scoop** is a tool like a bowl with a handle. It can be large or small and is used for digging into and lifting loose or soft materials. Mother used a metal <u>scoop</u> to put flour into the mixing bowl.

To **scoop** something is to take it up in a quick movement. Dan cupped his hands to <u>scoop</u> water from the pond.



A **support** is something used to hold an object in place and to keep it from falling. The shelf will fall without the wooden support.

To **support** something is to hold it in place or to keep it from falling. Anne <u>supported</u> the sign while Ryan nailed it to the post.





A **tangle** is a mix-up of things twisted or knotted together. The fishing line was in such a <u>tangle</u> that Bill had to cut it.

To **tangle** is to become twisted or knotted together. I tripped and fell when my feet got <u>tangled</u> in the rope.

To **weigh** something is to find out how heavy it is. Lucy <u>weighed</u> the puppy, and learned that it had gained almost two pounds since last week.

To **weigh** a certain amount is to have that much heaviness. The baby <u>weighed</u> seven pounds when he was born.

Weight is the measure of how heavy something is. The <u>weight</u> of a stick of butter is four ounces.

Story

Read the story below and then answer the questions that follow it.



Have you ever seen a bat hanging in some high corner of a room? Were you afraid? A bat can't talk. But imagine it could. Let's hear what it has to say.

You probably think I'm ugly. A lot of people do. Maybe it's my wide wings, **enormous** ears, and small body. Some people are afraid of bats because they think we will get **tangled** in their hair. That's silly. I can fly through a **gap** in a fence no wider than your hand, and I don't even touch the sides with my wings. Do you think I'm going to fly by **accident** into someone's hair? It's not very likely.

Here is another thing you should know. I'm nosy, just like people. If I see a small opening near the roof or in the wall, I like to find out what's on the other side. So if you see me fly into your house, just open some doors and windows to help me get out. I don't want to be there any more than you want me there.

I am a small brown bat. I **weigh** less than half an ounce. Because I am so light, I fly very well. I'm like an **acrobat** in the air. I need to be because my food is flying insects. Once I spot one, I go after it and **scoop** it up in my mouth. And I do it in the dark. Pretty clever, don't you think? People hate mosquitoes because they bite, but we bats love them. It is easy for me to eat a couple of hundred bugs and still be hungry for more.

You probably don't believe that I can catch bugs in the dark. But it's true! That's because I "see" them with my ears. Here's how I do it. I make sounds that are so high you can't even hear them. No human can. These sounds hit the bug I'm chasing and **bounce** back to me. The sounds tell me just where the bug is as I fly after it. My big ears help me catch the sounds. No matter how much it tries to get away, the bug doesn't have a chance.

Did you know that bats sleep by hanging upside down? This may seem strange, but there is a good reason for it. When I want to fly, all I have to do is let go and I'm in the air. I'm flying! If I started from the ground, my legs could not **support** me. All bats are like that. We have very strong wings but weak legs.

So when you see a bunch of us swooping and flying in circles just as it's getting dark, don't be **alarmed.** That's when the bugs come out, and flying bugs are our fast food. That is, they are fast, but we are faster. We are just enjoying our dinner.


