There were only about 150 of them at first. Their job was to maintain peace and justice in Canada's great Northwest. "I'm boss of this here town," boasted one desperado in the early days. "And no tin soldier is going to lock me up." Those were brave words, but that law-breaker and many others soon learned that the red-coated Mounties meant business. The new policemen seemed to be everywhere, enforcing the law and protecting the innocent. They rarely fired a shot; instead, they used their heads and now and then their fists.

Today there are over 4,000 Mounties scattered through all of Canada. In their bright red parade jackets, they make a picture every Canadian loves, for the Canadian Mounties have become a symbol of strength and fair play that has won the respect of people everywhere.
