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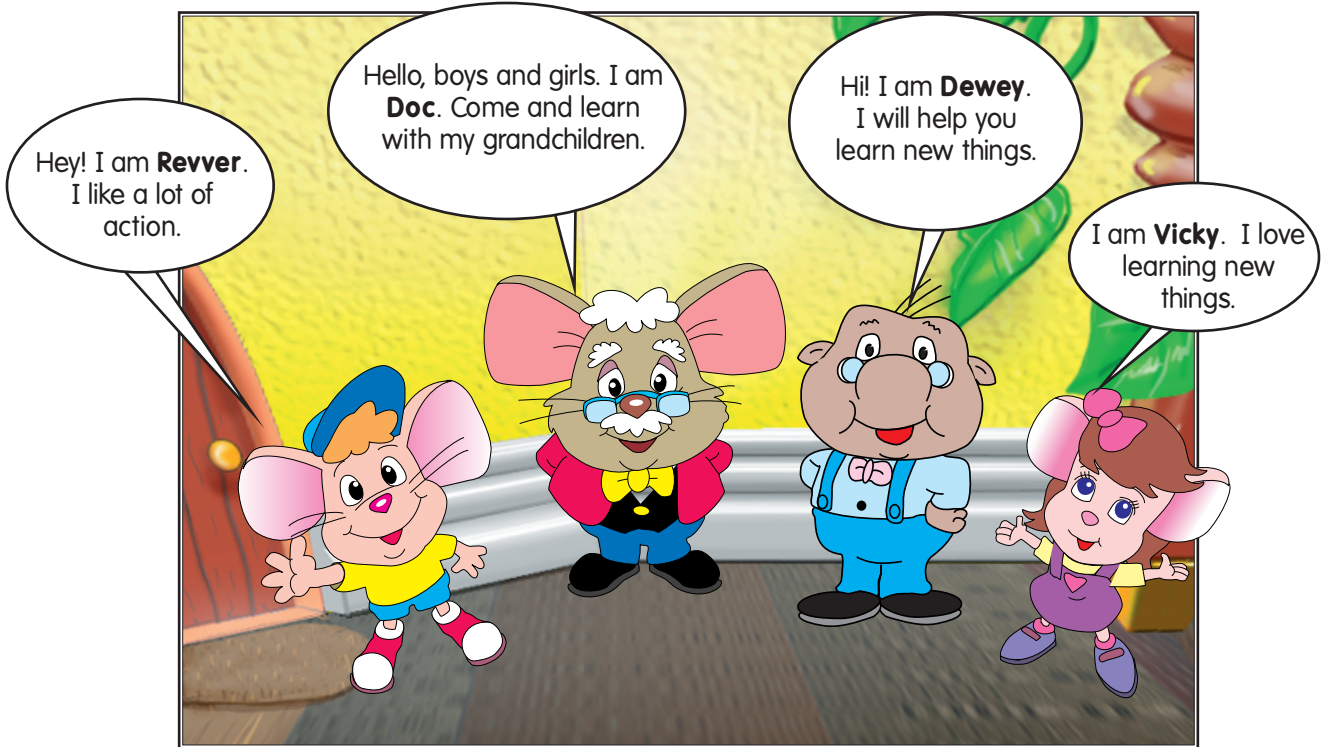
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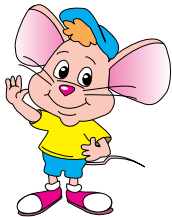

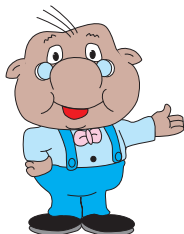

Mothers and fathers teach their children.

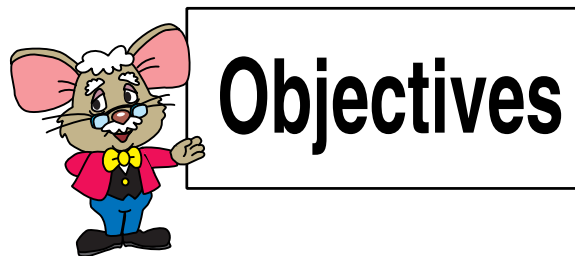
They teach them how to eat.

cocoon (co coon). A silky case caterpillars spin around themselves.

cushion (cush ion). A pillow to sit on.

emperor (em per or). The leader of Japan.

factory (fac tor y). A place where people work together to make something.

festival (fes ti val). A special day when people plan special things to do.

fishermen (fish er men). Men who catch fish.

geta (ge ta). A shoe made of wood.

island (is land). Land with water all around it.

kimono (kē mō` nō) or (ke mo' no). A loose robe.

lantern (lan tern). A light.

machine (ma chine). Something that helps people work or make things.

miso (mē' sō). A soup.

mulberry (mul ber ry). A small fruit that grows on a tree.

nori (nōr ē). Seaweed that can be eaten

oyster (oys ter). A fish with a shell.

paddy (pad dy). A field covered with water.

pearl. Something an oyster grows inside its shell.

plow. To dig up the soil.

poem (po em). Words written in lines that often rhyme.

porch. Front part of a house.

rice. A plant with white seeds that can be eaten.

seacoast (sea coast). Land near the sea.

shelf. A place to put things.

silk. A smooth cloth.

sneakers (sneak ers). Soft shoes.

tatami (tō tō' me). Mats that cover the floor.

vegetables (ve ge tables). Food.

village (vil lage). A very small town.

whale. An animal that lives in the sea.
