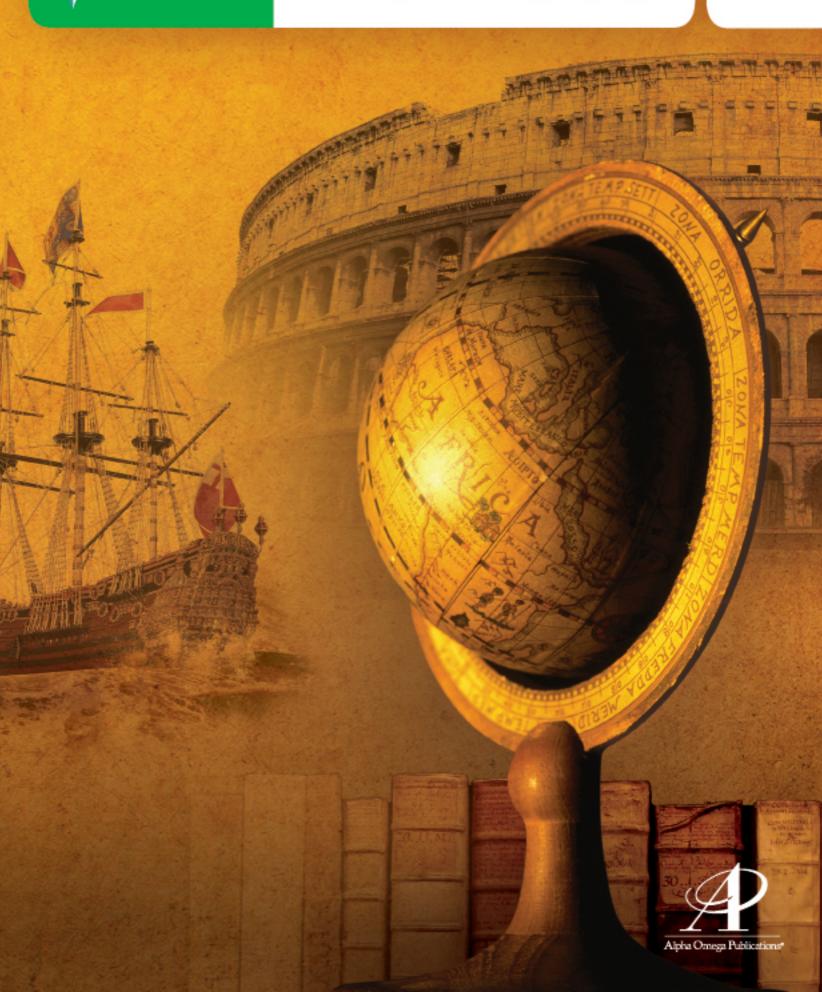

acre (a cre). A measure of land.

bandage (band age). Strip of cloth used to wrap a wound.

bin. Large box for holding things.

border (bor der). The side, edge, or part near anything.

breathe. Draw air in and out.

bruise. Mark on the outside of a fruit caused by poor handling.

canvas (can vas). A strong cloth.

capital (cap i tal). Most important or leading place.

cluster (clus ter). A number of things of the same kind growing together.

codling moth (cod ling moth). A small insect that can harm apples.

conveyor (con vey or). A moving belt that carries things from one place to another.

dairy (dair y). Farm where milk is produced.

eastern (east ern). Toward the east.

elevation (el e va tion). How high a place is above sea level.

festival (fes ti val). A special day to honor some great thing that has happened.

freckles (freck les). Small, light-brown spots on the skin.

grade. Place in order of how good or bad something is.

harvest (har vest). The time when crops are brought in.

heal. Make well.

irrigate (ir ri gate). Get water to the land by using ditches.

juicy (juic y). Runny, full of juice.

lopsided (lop sid ed). Larger on one side than on the other.

nectar (nec tar). Sweet liquid found in flowers.

nursery (nurs er y). Place where young trees or plants are raised for sale.

orchard (or chard). Piece of ground on which fruit trees are grown.

polisher (pol ish er). Something or someone who makes something smooth and shiny.

pollen (pol len). A fine, yellow dust found inside flowers.

prop. Hold up by placing something under or against.

prune. Cut out branches that are not wanted.

rotten (rot ten). Spoiled.

spillway (spill way). Place for water to escape when a dam gets too full.

temperature (tem per a ture). How hot or cold something is.

thorn. Sharp-pointed part on the stem or branch of a tree or plant.

tray. A flat holder with a rim around it.

welcome (wel come). To give a friendly greeting.


western (west ern). Toward the west.
