

bunkhouse (bungk' hous). The house of a cowboy.

chaps (chaps). The leather pieces used to protect the legs.

chuck (chuk). Food.

coast (kōst). Land beside a large body of water.

corral (ku ral'). The fenced-in area for animals.

cotton (kot' un). A plant from which cloth is made.

ditch (dich). A place dug in the ground.

flapjack (flap' jak). A pancake.

fire tender (fir' ten' dur). The cowboy who made the fire for the branding.

gentling (jen' tling). Taming an animal.

grazing land (grāz ing land). Grassland used to feed cattle.

herd (hèrd). A group of cattle.

inspector (in spek' tur). A person who checks on things.

lasso (las' ō). A looped rope.

mission (mish' un). The place where a missionary teaches.

missionary (mish' u ner' ē). A messenger of God.

night herder (nīt hėr' dur). The cowboy who guards the cattle at night.

outrider (out' ri' dur). The cowboy who rode ahead on the trail.
panhandle (pan' han' dul). A piece of land reaching away from the main part of land.

range (rānj). Flat grassland used for grazing.
riding circle (rī' ding sėr' kul). Going in circles to find calves.
rodeo (rō' dē' ō). A show with horses.
roundup (round' up). Bringing the cattle off the range.
rustler (rus' lur). A person who steals cattle or horses.
settler (set' lur). A person who came to a land first.
stampede (stam pēd'). Animals running away wildly.
tame (tām). Not wild.
tomato (tu mā' tō). A plant that has fruit that can be eaten.
top hand (top' hand). The cowboy in charge.
wrangler (rang' glur). The cowboy who kept the extra horses.
