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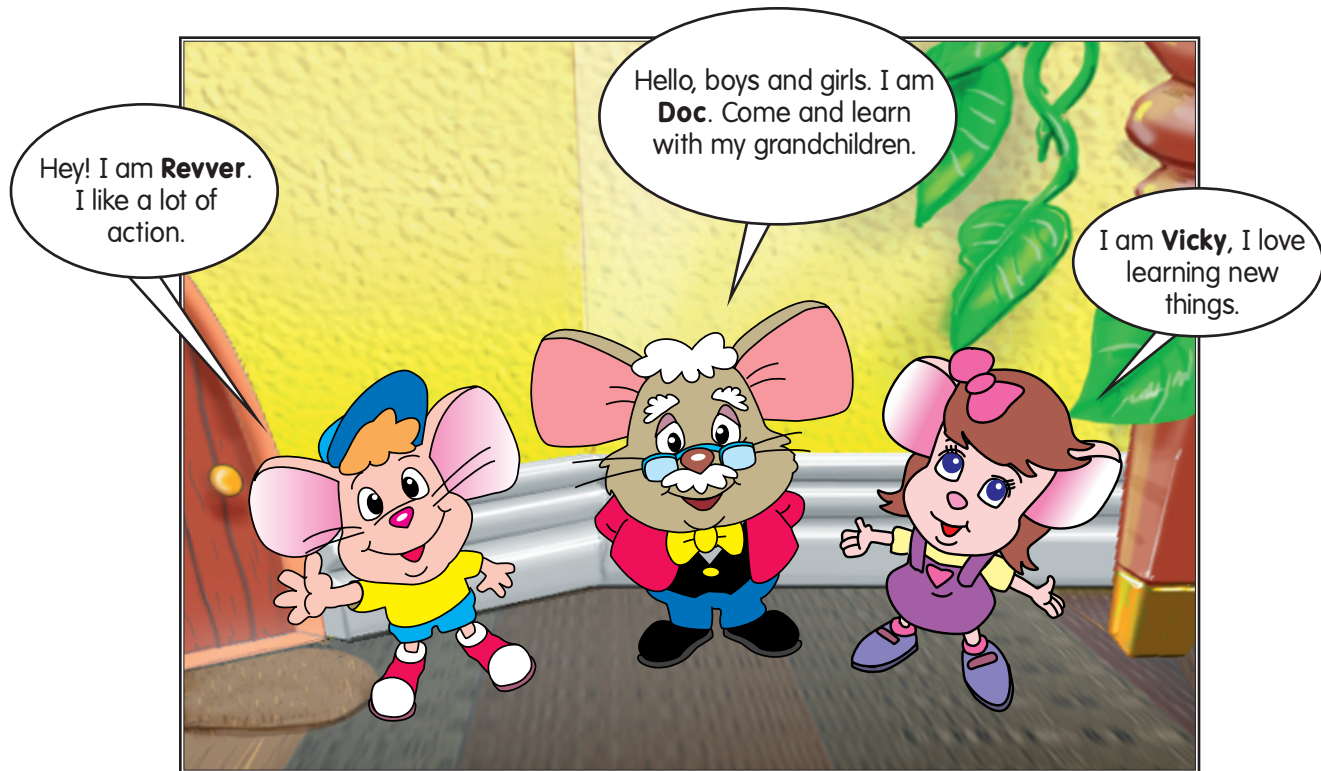
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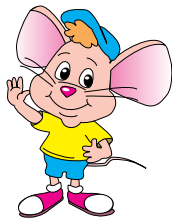

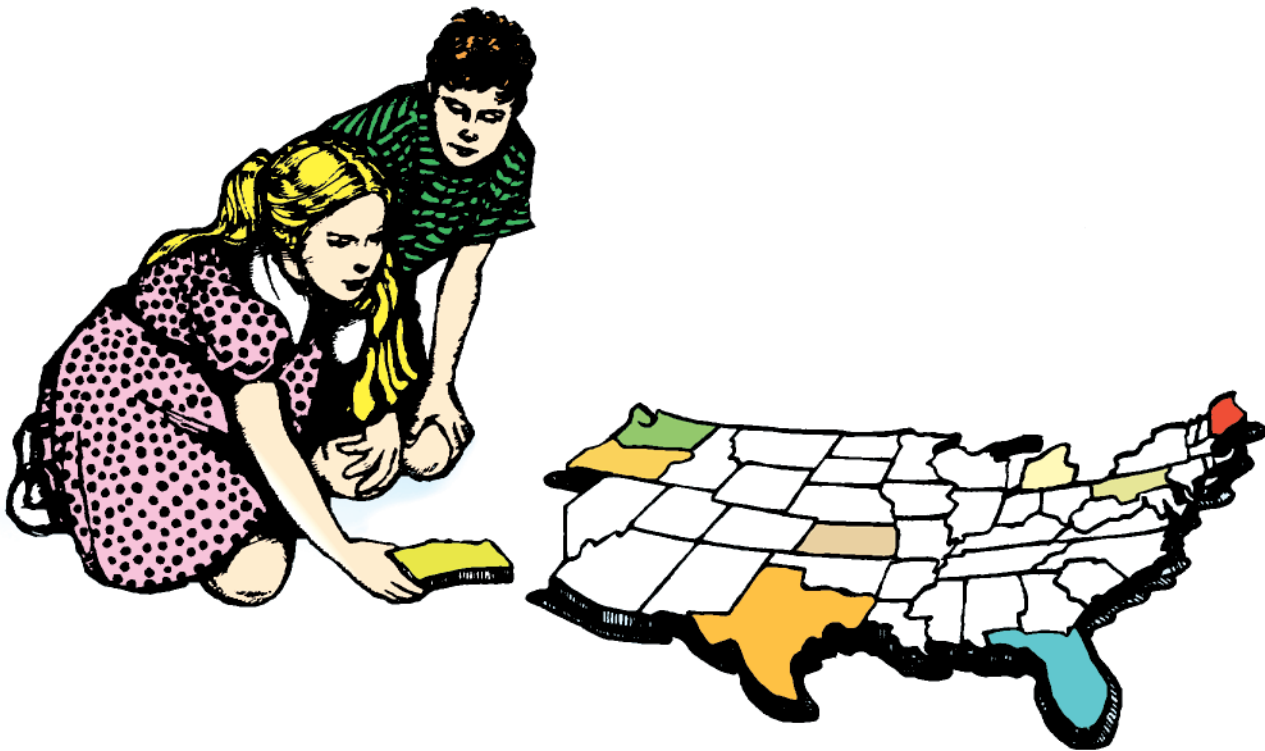

In this LIFEPAC® you will restudy the nine different states. You will be able to recall some important things about each of the nine states.

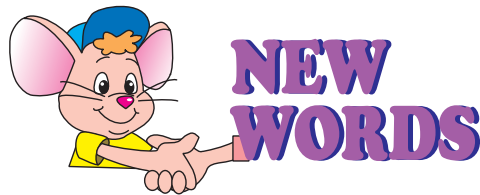

ape (āp). The logger who saws off the tree top.

assembly line (u sem' blē līn). Row of workers and machines along which work is passed until the product is finished.

barbecue (bār' bu kyü). An outdoor meal. The meat is cooked over an open fire.

bay (bā). The part of the sea partly surrounded by the land.

brand (brand). The mark of a ranch burned on an animal's skin.

buoy (boi). A floating marker put in a certain place in the sea to warn or to show a safe course for ships.

cable car (kā' bul kär'). A car pulled by ropes up the hill.

cargo (kär' gō). Load of goods carried by a ship or airplane.

collection (ku lek' shun). Group of things gathered from many places.

construction (kun struk' shun). Putting something together.

elevator (el' u vā tur). A place for storing grain.

energy (en' ur jē). Power; the strength to do something.

explosion (ek splō' zhun). Blowing up with a loud noise.

fertilizer (fēr' tu lī zur). Product that helps the soil.

fog (fog). A cloud of fine drops of water just above the ground or sea.

fuel (fyü' ul). Anything that burns.

graze (grāz). Feed on growing grass.

hail (hāl). Frozen drops of water.

herring (her' ing). A small food fish.

high climber (hī klīm' ur). The man who cuts off the short branches of the tall trees.

information (in fur mā' shun). News, facts, or things known.

irrigate (ir' u gāt). To supply with water by using ditches.

manufacturing (man' yu fak' chur ing). Making things by hand or machine.

mining (mī' ning). Digging out resources from the ground.

mission (mish' un). The place where a missionary teaches.

missionary (mish' u ner' ē). A person who tells others about God.

nectar (nek' tur). Sweet juice found in flowers.

notch (noch). A cut shaped like a V.

nursery (nēr' sur ē). A place where plants are grown.

orchard (ōr' churd). Piece of ground on which fruit trees are grown in straight rows.

panhandle (pan' han' dul). A piece of land reaching away from the main part of land.

peat (pēt). A softer, early form of coal.

pollen (pol' un). A fine, yellow dust found inside flowers.

preserves (pri zervz'). A place to keep animals safe.

priest (prēst). A special servant of God.

product (prod' ukt). Anything that is made or grown.

prop (prop). To hold up by placing something under or against it.

resource (ri sōrs'). Part of the earth; God-made not man-made.

restaurant (res' tur unt). A place to buy and eat a meal.

sardines (sär dēnz'). Small fish used for food. Usually canned in oil.

satellite (sat' u līt). A heavenly body that goes around another heavenly body.

settlers (set' lurz). People who came to a land first.

shaft mining (shaft m ī' ning). Mining done under the ground.

sod (sod). Earth and grass together.

space capsule (spās kap' sul). A machine used to fly in outer space.

steel (stēl). A mixture of carbon and iron that is very hard and strong.

strip mining (strip m ī' ning). Mining done on the top of the ground.

stump (stump). The lower part of the tree after the top is cut off.

swallow (swol' ō). A small bird that flies fast.
