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4. How did they make the house empty?

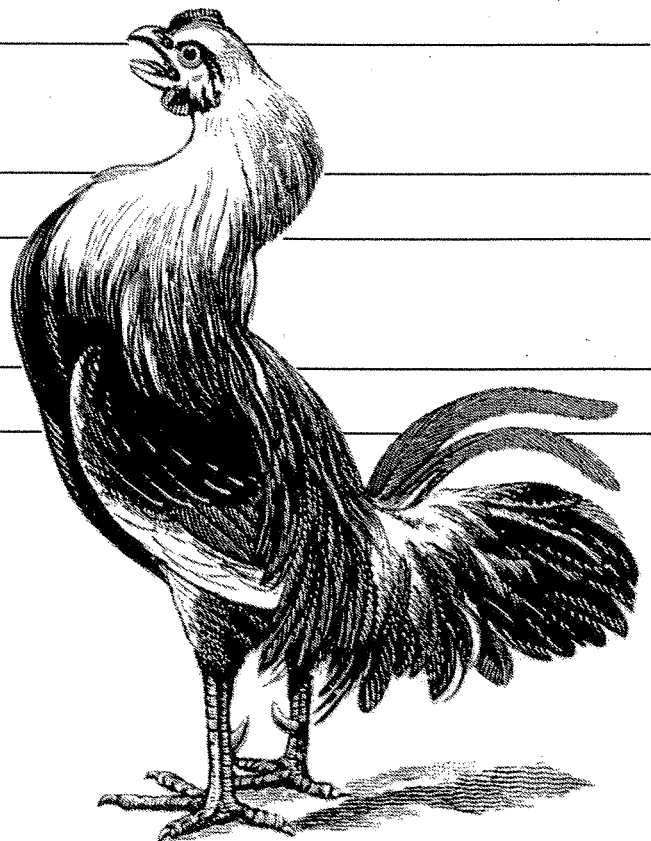
5. Describe what the robber thought each animal was when he came back at midnight.
