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
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Introduction

Bible Treasures: Genesis to Ruth is a children's Bible storybook written specifically for kindergartners, though children of many ages will enjoy the familiar stories and accompanying pictures. As the title implies, this book focuses on stories found within the books of Genesis through Ruth. Characters such as Adam, Eve, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Joshua, Ruth, and others are brought to life within these pages.


Bible Treasures is based on a thirty-six week school year. Each week consists of four Bible lessons and one review lesson. While this may seem like a lot of stories for young children, this format is intended to provide the children with a comprehensive, chronological overview of the Bible books of Genesis through Ruth. The stories naturally follow one another and are short enough that they can easily be re-read as often as your child desires and your time allows.

Each weekly lesson also includes two questions about the Bible story, one thought question, a Bible memory verse, and a question from the *First Catechism* (copyright© 2003, Great Commission Publications). The story questions are easily answered in one or two words. The thought questions are meant to promote thought and discussion between you and your child. The memory verses and catechism questions are meant to be memorized by your child in order to help hide God's word and truth in his or her heart. Teachers and parents are encouraged to review the Bible verse and catechism question each day to help their child memorize more quickly.

A review lesson is provided at the end of each week. This lesson reviews the Bible verse and catechism questions from the week. This review will also, as the weeks pass by, begin including catechism questions from previous lessons to help your child review. A fun craft or activity, meant to help students review some of the week's Bible lessons, is also provided in the review lesson at the end of each week.

A short answer key is provided at the end of the book. The answers correspond to the questions listed at the end of each Bible story. No answers are provided for the thought questions, as they are meant merely to help guide discussion.

LESSON 1

Who Made the World? Part I

Genesis 1:1

How old are you? Perhaps you are five years old, or six. Do you know what it means when you say that you are six years old? It means that God made you about six years ago. That is not a very long time.

Your father and mother were alive many years before that. Maybe your mother is thirty years old. That means that God made your mother about thirty years ago. Maybe your grandparents are sixty years old. Sixty years is a long life; but there was once a time when even your grandparents had not been made. If your grandparents' lives seem long, they are short compared with the time that happened before God made them.

God made the world such a long time ago that no one can tell you exactly how long ago the world began. God made the first man as many as six thousand years ago. For thousands of years there have been men, women, boys, girls, and little babies in this world. Only God knows exactly when they began to live.

There was once a time when there were no people at all in the world. There was just a world, without men and things

that men made, like houses and roads. There were trees and animals, but there were no people.

A very long time ago, there was not even a world. Think of it: no great, big, beautiful world! There was only emptiness. That was before God made the world.

Yet there was something in that faraway time before anything at all was made. God was there; but if God made the whole world, then who made God?

No one made God. God has always been alive. Forever and ever and ever, God has lived. It is hard for us to understand that God never began to live; but it is true. We know that every man and woman in the world was made by God. Our lives began when God made us; but God's life had no beginning. There has never been a time when there was no God, and there will never be a time without God. People grow old. They change, and they die. God, however, will never die; and He will always be the same. He will go on and on forever. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever; God is eternal (Hebrews 13:8, 1 Timothy 1:17).

LESSON 2

Who Made the World? Part II

Genesis 1

God is very wonderful and very great. He can do many things that we cannot do. We can only be in one place at a time. If we want to be in some other place, we have to get up and go there. God is so wonderful that He can be everywhere in the world at the same time. If we go into the deepest ocean, God is there. If we fly up into the sky, God is there. God is everywhere.

God sees us all the time. He knows everything that we do. He hears every word that we speak. He even knows the thoughts that we have in our minds. We cannot hide from God. If we do wrong, God knows it, even if we have not told anyone. He also knows when we have tried to be good and to please Him, even if no one else in the world knows.

God is wonderful in another way, too. He knew from the beginning everything that is going to happen in the world. We do not know what is going to happen tomorrow. That is because our minds are so small. God is so great that He knows everything. He knows what is going to happen not only tomorrow, but all the time until the very end of the world. God knows what will happen, even after the world has passed away.

God is perfectly good, too. You are sometimes good and sometimes naughty. You are not perfectly good, are you? Your friends are sometimes good and sometimes naughty. None of them is perfectly good. Even your mom and dad are not perfectly good. God, however, is so perfectly good that He cannot do anything wrong. Everything that God does is right.

God is also very loving. He loves His children more than anyone else in the world loves them. God also takes care of His children and is always near them. God never sleeps. All night long, when His children are sleeping, God is watching over them and caring for them. He keeps their hearts beating, and He keeps them breathing, even when they are asleep. He cares for His children day and night.

God wants you to love Him, too. You can talk to God. He will hear you. He loves to have children talk to Him. You can say to Him, "Dear God, I love You for loving me so much, and for taking care of me all the time. I thank You for making me."

If we love God and tell Him that we know we are not perfectly good, He will forgive us for our sin. He knows that we are not perfectly good; but He sent His Son Jesus to die for our sin. That way God can bring His children home to live with Him in heaven.

God lives in heaven. Heaven is more beautiful than any place you have ever seen. It is more beautiful than you can ever imagine. There is no sickness or sadness in heaven, but all is joy and happiness. There are no tears or crying. There is no death. There is no dark night in heaven; but it is always bright, beautiful day. Those in heaven do not need the light of the sun, for the glory of God makes it brighter than the sun. So if we love God and have been forgiven, then we will go to live with God in heaven after we die.

LESSON 3

Angels

Genesis 2:1, Luke 2:8–20, James 2:19, Jude 1:6

A long time ago, God made the angels to live with Him in heaven. Angels are not like people. They are much stronger than people and can do many things we cannot do. They can go wherever God sends them. Sometimes they even come down from heaven to this earth.

Angels were created by God to be perfectly good. After God created them, some of them chose to follow a wicked angel named Satan. These angels became evil and are now called demons or devils. The angels that followed God are still called angels and are still perfectly good.

The good angels love God very much. They spend all their time loving God, praising Him, and doing what He commands. There are a lot of angels, more than we can count.

Some of the angels are called archangels because they are greater than the rest. God told us that the name of one of the archangels is Gabriel. Gabriel has been sent down to earth several times. He was sent to Mary before Jesus was born to tell her that Jesus would be God's Son (Luke 1:26).

And when Jesus was born, the whole sky was filled with angels singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men!" (Luke 2:14).

The Bible tells us that God sent angels down to earth at least twenty times. And the people who love God will someday go to heaven and see the angels and hear them sing of God's glory because they love God.

The demons, however, do not love God. They hate Him. When the demons sinned against God, He threw them out of heaven. These demons are cruel and love to cause suffering. They do not want people to love God. They do not want people to go to live in heaven with God when they die. They know that people are weak and have sinful natures that want to disobey God. So demons try to tempt people into sin.

God wants people to obey Him and love Him. We need to ask God to help us love and obey Him because we cannot do it by ourselves. God is much stronger than all the demons put together. He can help us be obedient if we ask Him.

LESSON 4

Creation

Genesis 1

“In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth” (Genesis 1:1). This is the very first verse of the Bible. Without the Bible, we would not know who created the world.

Do you know what the word *created* means? It means that God made the world out of nothing. When a man makes a house, he must first have wood and nails to build it and some glass for the windows. If he does not have the materials to build the house, then he cannot build the house.

However, God does not need materials to create things. He made the world out of nothing at all; and He made it in six days. When God spoke, the world began.

At first, everything was very dark. However, on the first day of creation, “God said, ‘Let there be light’; and there was light. And God saw the light, that it was good” (Genesis 1:3–4). And God separated the light from the darkness. The light was called Day and the darkness was called Night. That was the very first day. And it is still God who, every day, sends the sun so that we can wake up to work and play. He also sends the darkness every night so we can sleep.

On the second day, God separated the waters and created the sky with its clouds. And on the third day, God made dry land, which He called Earth. All the water was called Seas. Then the earth was ready for things to grow on it. So God created all kinds of trees and grass and flowers to grow on the earth.

Next, the earth needed more light for the day and for the night. So God created the burning sun to shine during the day and the shining moon and stars to shine at night.

The first animals God made were the fish and the birds. They were created on the fifth day to live in the seas and fly in the air. Big and little fish began to swim around, and birds began to sing in the trees.

On the last day of creation, God made all the animals and creeping things. Lions and tigers began to pounce, and herds of cows and sheep fed in the earth’s meadows. Goats and deer climbed up mountains, while rabbits chased through the grass. Bears tramped through forests, and monkeys swung through the trees. Huge elephants, tall giraffes, and tiny kittens—they were all made by God. And at the very end of the day, God created people.

Finally, on the seventh day, God rested. He blessed the seventh day and made it holy (Genesis 2:3a). God wanted His people to rest on the seventh day, too. Back then the day of rest was on Saturday; but after Jesus came to earth, died on the cross, and rose from the dead on Sunday, the day of rest changed. That is why Christians set aside Sunday, the first day of the week, for going to church and resting. Sunday is a holy day, a special day for worshipping God.

After all the work of creating the world, God looked at everything He had made. “Then God saw everything that He had made, and indeed it was very good” (Genesis 1:31).







LESSON 6

The First Man

Genesis 1:26–2:7

Man was the last thing God created. He gave man eyes to see, ears to hear, and a mouth to speak and eat. Most animals have all these things, too. However, God made man different from all the other animals by giving him a living soul.

No other creature has a soul. It is our souls that make us love other people and love God. People cannot see their souls, but every person has one. People's bodies are the houses for their souls.

If we lose an arm or a leg, we lose a part of our body. We do not lose ourselves. We are still here. Our bodies are not who we are; they are just houses. Our souls are who we are.

Our souls are wonderful things. Our souls can love God and think about Him. Animals have no souls, so they cannot think about or love God. People are the only ones with souls because people are the only ones who are made in God's image.

The Bible says that "the LORD God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of

life; and man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7). The soul is a great gift from God because our souls will never die. Animals die, and they are gone because they have only bodies; but when people die, their souls go on living forever.


Angels are not like people, either. They do not have bodies at all. They are spirits. God is Spirit, too. He does not have a body. We cannot see God because He is Spirit.

God wants us to take care of our souls. We can do that by reading our Bibles, listening in church, and praying to God. We should try to please Him. If we do not love God with our souls, then our souls will not go to live with God in heaven when we die. Instead, they will go to hell, which is far away from God.

The first man God created on the sixth day also had a soul. God called the first man Adam. Adam was an adult when God made him, and he was all alone in the world, without any other people. He only had the animals and God for company; but God knew that Adam could not live alone forever.

LESSON 7

The First Woman

Genesis 2:15–25

Do you think you would like to be all alone in the world like Adam? He was the only person on the earth. He had no other person to talk to, but he could talk to God. God came to him and talked to him in the cool of the day; but there was no other man, woman, or child to whom Adam could talk.

At night, he had to lie down all by himself; but he was not afraid, for none of the animals would hurt him. They were not wild or fierce.

And God took care of Adam. He planted a most beautiful garden called the garden of Eden. He filled it with wonderful trees and plants whose fruit was delicious to eat. Adam lived in this garden. When Adam was hungry, all he had to do was go and pick some fruit. In that beautiful garden, things grew with God’s help. Adam did not have to dig up the ground, plant the seeds, water them, or pull up weeds. Every plant was pleasant to look at, and every fruit was good to eat in the garden of Eden.

Adam was allowed to eat the fruit of all the trees in the garden except for one, the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. God told Adam that if he ate the fruit from that tree, then he would die. This tree grew in the middle of the garden along with another special tree, the tree of life. Whoever ate the fruit of that tree would live forever.

God made Adam good. Adam was never naughty or wicked. God warned him plainly about the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, and Adam listened. All Adam knew was goodness, and God did not want him to know about wickedness.


Adam was very happy in the garden of Eden. God brought all the animals to Adam so he could name them all. When he was done naming the animals, Adam still had no one to be his companion. So God said, “It is not good that man should be alone; I will make him a helper comparable to him” (Genesis 2:18).



Adam was happy that he was no longer alone. He had someone to talk to and to love. Adam called the woman Eve, and she was his wife. They could wander through the garden together and eat the delicious fruit.

Adam and Eve did not have to wear clothes. They did not know anything about clothes. They went naked and were not ashamed because they were innocent. They did not yet know what shame and sin were. Their souls were clean and pure.

LESSON 8

How Adam and Eve Disobeyed

Genesis 3:1–8

Adam and Eve were very happy in the garden of Eden. They were happier than anyone else has ever been because they were good in their hearts. They walked with God and were perfect because He had made them that way. Adam and Eve loved God. They loved each other, and they never wanted to be naughty.

There is something in our hearts that wants to be naughty because we have bad, sinful hearts. However, when God made Adam and Eve, He gave them hearts that wanted to be good. Their bodies were perfectly healthy, too. They never had to work hard as we work today. God's only command was for them to have many children and to rule over the earth. If they obeyed God, then Adam and Eve could live forever; they would never die. They were perfect people living in a perfect world.

How then has all the sin, tragedy, pain, suffering, sadness, and death entered our world? Adam and Eve disobeyed God.

Satan used to be one of God's angels in heaven; but he disobeyed God and was cast out of heaven with all the other wicked angels. Satan hates God. When he saw the beautiful world God made, he wanted to make Adam and Eve sin so they would be bad like him. Satan wanted Adam and Eve to be wicked and miserable. He wanted to spoil God's perfect world.

So Satan made use of a serpent, or snake. The snake was the craftiest animal in the world; and Satan, in the form of a snake, came and talked to Eve.


He asked, "Has God indeed said, 'You shall not eat of every tree of the garden?'"

Eve answered, "We may eat the fruit of the trees of the garden; but of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God has said, 'You shall not eat it, nor shall you touch it, lest you die.'"

Then Satan told Eve a wicked lie. He said, "You will not

surely die. For God knows that in the day you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil" (Genesis 3:1–5).

Eve listened to the snake instead of obeying God. She looked at the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. She thought it looked very good and thought that it might taste good, too. She knew God had said not to, but she disobeyed and ate some of the fruit anyway. And then she gave some of the fruit to Adam, and he ate,



too. Adam and Eve both disobeyed God.

How wicked and sad for them to disobey God who had made them and loved them. They no longer wanted to be good or to love and please God. They did not love each other but had angry, hateful feelings in their hearts and bad, wicked thoughts in their minds.

The fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil did let Adam and Eve know good and evil. Before, they only knew what good was! Now they knew what it was to have wicked thoughts and to do wicked things. How sad such knowledge was. The knowledge of wickedness made Adam

and Eve very unhappy. And they became ashamed that they were naked. They tried to sew fig leaves together to make clothes for themselves. And when they heard God walking in the garden, they hid from Him. That was the effect of sin on people.

LESSON 9

How God Punished Adam and Eve

Genesis 3:8–19

Adam and Eve were afraid of God when they heard Him walking in the garden. They knew they had disobeyed and that He would be angry. And so they hid.

However, the Lord God called out to Adam, “Where are you?”

And Adam answered, “I heard Your voice in the garden, and I was afraid because I was naked; and I hid myself.”

Then God asked, “Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you that you should not eat?”

And Adam, whose heart was now wicked, tried to blame his wife, even though he had sinned, too. He said, “The woman whom You gave to be with me, she gave me of the tree, and I ate.”

Then God asked the woman, “What is this you have done?”

And Eve, who also had a wicked heart, tried to blame the snake. She said, “The serpent deceived me, and I ate.”

Then the Lord God told that snake, “Because you have done this, you are cursed more than all cattle, and more than every beast of the field; on your belly you shall go, and you shall eat dust all the days of your life. And I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise His heel” (Genesis 3:9–15).

This prophecy looks forward to the time when God would send His own Son Jesus Christ as the Seed of a woman to crush Satan forever by defeating death. Even then with

Adam and Eve, God had a plan for His people that He loved, even though they were no longer perfect.

Because they sinned, God had to punish Adam and Eve, too. They would have to leave the garden of Eden. Eve would have great pain when she bore children. Her desire would be for her husband, and he would rule over her. Adam would also have to work very hard for his food. The ground would grow weeds and thorns, and Adam would have to work all of his life. In addition, both Adam and Eve would die. They could not live forever, and their bodies would return to the dust out of which God made them.

These curses from God were not just for Adam and Eve, either. From the moment they sinned, no human could be born perfect. People are now born with sin in their hearts. People are selfish and proud. They do not want to love and obey God. They want to love themselves. Sinful parents have sinful children, so all children are now born with wicked hearts because Adam and Eve are the parents from whom all the people of the world come.

If Adam and Eve had obeyed, they would have stayed perfect, and they would have stayed in the garden. But because they sinned, they became wicked, and now all people are born wicked. The Bible says, “There is none who does good, no, not one” (Psalm 53:3). All women now have pain in their lives; and all men have to work hard for a living. Also, all men and women will die. Worst of all, men and women are separated from God. Adam and Eve should not have disobeyed God. Today, we too should be afraid to disobey God, for He is our Maker and our Ruler.


