3. Any loud noise could start an **avalanche**.
4. Because the air is thin, climbers probably would say only what is necessary to save their breath for the climb.
5. The weather can change quickly for the worse, bringing **blizzards** or other dangerous storms.
6. Clear skies with little chance of snow would make a climber feel hopeful.
7. Into these rock openings, climbers drive spikes to hold their ropes for steep climbs.
8. *Route* means "the path that must be followed to get to a place."
