

Overview: This *American History Teacher Guide* contains materials for use with *American History* by James Stobaugh. Materials are organized by book in the following sections:



Features: Each suggested weekly schedule has five easy-to-manage lessons that combine reading, worksheets, and exams. Worksheets and exams are perforated and three-hole punched – materials are easy to tear out, hand out, grade, and store. You are encouraged to adjust the schedule and materials needed to best work within your educational program.

Workflow: Students will read the pages in their book and then complete each section of the Teacher Guide. Exams are given at regular intervals with space to record each grade. If used with younger students, they may be given the option of taking open-book exams.

Lesson Scheduling: Space is given for assignment dates. There is flexibility in scheduling. For example, the parent may opt for a M, W, F schedule, rather than a M-F schedule. Each week listed has five days but due to vacations the school work week may not be M–F. Adapt the days to your school schedule. As the student completes each assignment, he/she should put an "X" in the box.

Introduction

How this course is designed:

- **Chapters:** This course has 34 chapters (representing 34 weeks of study).
- **Lessons:** Each chapter has 5 lessons each, taking approximately 30 to 40 minutes each. There will be a short reading followed by worksheets.
- **Friday Project Day:** The purpose of these projects (one per semester) will be to compel students to utilize the themes of the course to better understand history on a larger scale. As such, you can select from a range of projects, finding one best suited to your interests. A few example prompts and creative project ideas will be given but, at the instructor's discretion, any creative project or prompt can be used that deals with the themes of the course. All essays should be five pages or longer and use no less than three chapters from the book, as well as three outside sources.
- **Student responsibility:** Responsibility to complete this course is on the student. Students are to complete the readings every day, handing their responses to a teacher for evaluation. Independence is strongly encouraged with this course designed for the student to practice independent learning.
- **Grading:** A teacher can grade assignments daily or weekly and keep track of this in their files. Worksheet answers are available in the back of the book.

Special note: This teacher guide has revised assignments. It is recommended that students do the worksheet assignments from this book rather than those contained in the student text.

Semester One Friday Project

This is the beginning of your semester-long project, which you will be working on every Friday instead of a traditional lesson/worksheet. The purpose of this project will be to compel students to utilize the themes of the course to better understand history on a larger scope. As such, you can select from a range of projects, finding one best suited to your interests. A few example prompts and creative project ideas will be given, but at the instructor's discretion, any creative project or prompt can be used that deals with the themes of the course. All essays will be five pages or longer, and use no less than three chapters from the book, as well as three outside sources. For this first Friday, all that the student needs to do is select a project and begin gathering the materials required to write it. If they choose an essay, begin looking for sources; if a piece of art is chosen, begin studying various artists, etc.

Prompts:

#1

In the very first lesson, the author lays out seven worldviews. For this prompt, you will choose three people covered in the text (feel free to look ahead to favorite figures from history, provided you select from the fall term) and gather a source from the library or Internet about each. Spend time dissecting the worldview of each figure before finishing with your own worldview.

#2

The first half of American history thematically shows that people in power will abuse that power. Within this essay, you will evaluate whether this is an inherently human drive, or if odious misconduct regarding those under one's control was ingrained in European culture. For this essay, look for sources delving into the morality of both Europeans and Native peoples/Africans.

#3

Along the same lines, we saw a great deal of mistreatment in the chapters thus far, however, that mistreatment led to the spread of the gospel. Was this abuse then worth it? Or did it lead to later generations disavowing Christianity due to previous hardships?


Creative Projects

Scoring of creative projects will be based on time spent and creative integration of themes and concepts from the course.

Song/poem — As long as it deals with themes or events/figures from the course this is fine. Must be full-length song (3–5 minutes) or at least one page of poetry. For this project, multiple 1 page response essays will be required detailing the meaning and influences of the piece.

Painting/drawing — Students are encouraged to stretch their imaginations while displaying themes/people/events discussed in the book.

Scrapbook/photo journal — For this project, finding ways to capture elements from the text in everyday life is key. Whether this means a picturesque view of nature, photos taken at museums/Civil War memorials, or a collections of objects from the 18th and 19th century on display, the key is always cohesion of intent and creativity.
